In recent times the relations of medicine and surgery have become so complex, and in certain directions are still so perverse, that I have preferred to deal with them at their sources, and in their earlier and simpler connexions and contrasts; that is, in ancient and medieval times. In the times of Greece and Alexandria medicine and surgery were one; to the clear eye of the Greek they could not be sundered: in medieval times on the other hand new and vaster social constructions, new and more conflicting conditions, compelled our fathers to build...



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
